From Australia to Zimmermann: A Brief History of Cable Telegraphy During World War One

Following the start of World War One, Britain cut Germany's undersea telegraph cables, leaving a single transatlantic cable intact. Britain was able to read any message this cable carried, leading to the interception of the controversial Zimmermann telegram in 1917. In return, Germany tried to destroy Allied telegraph cables in the Pacific and Indian Oceans; attacking telegraph stations at Fanning Island and the Cocos Islands in 1914. This was the start of the "cable wars", which shows the strategic importance of the global telegraph network.
